Thank you for joining me this fall in reading Ephesians. I've heard from many of you who have found Paul's words particularly powerful this fall. God speaks to us through all of scripture, and yet Ephesians does have special significance in 2024, doesn't it? Consider Paul's words in Ephesians 5:15-16 (which we'll talk about together on October 13): "Be careful, then, how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, making the most of the time, because the days are evil."

Making the most of the time is a goal of nearly everyone I meet in the fall of every year. The philosopher Seneca put it well, "It's not that we have little time, but more that we waste a good deal of it." Of course, Paul adds a deeper, spiritual dimension to the struggle: "Make the most of the time," he says, "because the days are evil." We pick up a newspaper or turn on the television and find ourselves nodding in agreement, just like generations before us.

One of the temptations we face, particularly in the church, is nostalgia. If we could just go back to the way things were, we say, everything would be alright. Gil Rendle defines nostalgia as "using the solutions of the past to solve the problems of today." It's deeply flawed, but we all do it. I know of a church that, during the recent debates over disaffiliation, circulated letters urging the church to "get back to the way things were in the 50s." Of course, what the letter forgot (I hope unintentionally) is that America was segregated in 1950. And in the United Methodist Church women didn't receive full clergy rights until 1956. Going back to the past will not work. There must be another option to meet the challenges of our day.

"Make the most of the time," Paul says. Is he really suggesting the answer to the darkness and evil of this world is better time management? In the Greek the word he uses means to redeem or to buy back. It is a word best used to describe what God does in and through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

The more times I read Ephesians, the more I'm struck by the incredible depth in Paul's words. The days are dark, evil, full of chaos and struggle... but look carefully and closely underneath it all. God is at work. Redemption is possible. It <u>is</u> happening.

Paul is encouraging us to embrace and celebrate the significance of every moment we are blessed to live. We live with hope, trusting in the redeeming grace of Jesus Christ. We share in His transforming work as we become more like him. We live every moment and minute and hour and day to the glory of God.

May it be so for you and for our congregation in these days together. Thank you for allowing me to serve as your pastor.

### OCTOBER 06—Ephesians 4:25-5:2

So then, putting away falsehood, let each of you speak the truth with your neighbor, for we are members of one another. Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and do not make room for the devil. Those who steal must give up stealing; rather, let them labor, doing good work with their own hands, so as to have something to share with the needy. Let no evil talk come out of your mouths but only what is good for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear. And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which you were marked with a seal for the day of redemption. Put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you. Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, and walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

# OCTOBER 13—Ephesians 5:15-20

Be careful, then, how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, making the most of the time, because the days are evil. So do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. Do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit, as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs to one another, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### OCTOBER 20—Ephesians 6:10-20

Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power; put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil, for our struggle is not against blood and flesh but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to withstand on the evil day and, having prevailed against everything, to stand firm. Stand, therefore, and belt your waist with truth and put on the breastplate of righteousness and lace up your sandals in preparation for the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end, keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. Pray also for me, so that when I speak a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak.



Our Congregational Care Ministers and retired clergy are available to pray with you.





FUMC Belmont had an incredible opportunity to hear from one of our retired Bishops, Kenneth L. Carder. He served as a UMC pastor in Tennessee and in Virgina and as a Bishop in Nashville and Mississippi. During his talk he spoke about the calling he had on his life to become the full time caregiver for his wife Linda who had dementia. # THE DIFFERENCE ONE NIGHT CAN MAKE

On Sunday, September 22, our church gathered for our annual Not-So-Silent Auction to benefit Zoe Empowers. In 2017, we partnered with our very first Empowerment Group and have continued our efforts ever since. We are now partnering with our sixth Empowerment Group- Umunezero, meaning happiness. Our prayers and support for this group of 24 households began in July 2023 and will continue through June 2026 as they learn from Zoe, dream about their futures and take steps

to bring themselves out of poverty into self-sufficiency.

This three-year period is designed to allow congregations to use those three years to raise their \$27,000 commitment (\$9,000 a year) to fund a community. Yet, through your generosity, we raised over one year's worth of our commitment to Umunezero in one night! As a result?







they would like to start, to creating community amongst themselves, and beginning to create a financial support effort to address much needed financial needs as they arise, they have been busy! Younger household members return to school and begin getting an education- schooling, hygiene, and more. As you pray, consider the efforts it takes to dream and make them come true. Think of the staff teaching and the young children learning and pray for them. Think of the sickness that strikes here in our community and pray for the health of our community in Rwanda, too.

Thank you to our own community of supporters of Zoe who helped make this night so successful. From donation soliciting, amazon wish list purchasing, basket assembly, kitchen cooking, meal plating, dinner servers, church members creating, and everything in between, more than 80 volunteers in our church gave time, items or both to make our night happen. More than 20 local businesses also donated. Thank you!
