
# Tri-Angles

Dear FUMC Family,

Throughout 2024 we have been prayerfully reading Paul's Letter to the Ephesians together. If you haven't had the chance, I hope you will join us now. Start in chapter 1, selecting a few verses to read each day. As you read, note a word or phrases that stands out to you. Spend some time reflecting on what God might be saying to you through the word or phrase. Then, write a short prayer in response to what you hear God saying. Finally, consider one concrete way you can live out what you've heard in the days ahead. Try this each day until you get to the end of chapter 6. Then, return again to chapter 1 and begin again!

I'm really excited to begin a special worship/preaching series on Ephesians beginning September 8. Throughout the month, and into October, we'll look together at this incredible letter and all that it has to say to us. At the core, Ephesians presents a vision of what our life in Christ is all about: who we were created and saved to be in Him. As Paul puts it in Chapter 1, to "live for the praise of his glory."

As Paul celebrates all that Christ has done for us, the vision he casts for the Church is stunning. "[Christ] is our peace," Paul proclaims in Ephesians 2:14. In spite of all that might divide and separate us (and there was much to separate the church in Ephesus), there is unity and peace in Christ. Through his life, death and resurrection we become "fellow citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God."

I can think of no better message to preach and proclaim in 2024. Wars rage on multiple fronts. Already we find ourselves in the midst of a bitter, divisive election season that only promises to get worse. As I shared in a recent sermon, Americans these days seem obsessed with playing the "blame game," finding others to be upset with at all times. Sadly, we have seen these dynamics play out in the life of the church, and in our neighborhoods and workplaces and families far too often. There is a deep need and hunger for peace all around us.

Ephesians reminds us that Christ is the source of our peace. We fix our lives on Jesus, striving to be more like him in all that we do. "Living for the praise of his glory" is but another way of saying to "be more like Jesus." And as we do, we preach and proclaim Christ and the peace He offers to all those we meet.

I hope you will join me in spreading the good news of Christ and his peace this fall. We have two incredible ways to do so:

- Brand new **FUMC Belmont T-Shirts**, available for purchase on Sundays for \$10, with proceeds benefitting our United Methodist missionary partners in Madagascar and Brazil.
- "Christ Is Our Peace" yard signs, which will be available on September 1. How amazing would it be, in a sea of signs for candidates running for election (often a reminder of all that divides us), to see these all over Belmont?!

We've designed these shirts and signs intentionally. They are purple, the color of royalty – a reminder that Christ gets our ultimate, final allegiance, over and above all the kingdoms and rulers of this world. Of course, purple is also a mixture of red and blue. We're not out to be a

"red church" or "blue church" because we know that we're a better church because of our disagreements and differences! We can stay in community and relationship with one another because we are fixed on Christ, and Christ is our peace!

The shirts and signs also feature our church logo, a series of leaves which is inspired, in part, by Revelation 22's description of the tree of life: "the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations." We are called, First United Methodist Church of Belmont, to be more like Jesus together, bringing healing and peace to all those around us. The world needs us and the good news we offer now more than ever. Christ is our peace.

Fall is always an exciting time to be part of FUMC Belmont. Read on in this newsletter for all the ways to be in ministry with us. I look forward to it all, and thank you, as always, for giving me the privilege of serving as your pastor.




