Welcome to First United Methodist Church of Belmont! We're glad that you've chosen to worship with us this evening. We invite you to explore all the opportunities we have for children, youth and adults of all ages and stages of life. We seek to be a community of faith that welcomes all as we grow to be more like Jesus Christ for our community, loving and serving God and one another in all that we do.

What Happened To The Benediction? The services of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday do not "end" as most services do with a blessing or benediction. Instead, we are asked to depart on our own, in silence. Usually, it feels like something is missing, that somehow the service is not really complete. And, in fact, it isn't. The mysteries we celebate on these days are incomplete without also telling the Easter Gospel. The early church observed these services as one continuous worship service. As uncomfortable as it may be, leaving off the blessing helps us remember that the story does not end tonight: Easter is coming!

Tonight's Bulletin Cover features *The Washing of Feet* by German priest and artist Sieger Köder (1925–2015), a powerful depiction of Christ's humility on the night of his betrayal. Jesus kneels before Peter, washing his feet—a posture of service and love that redefines what true authority looks like. In the water, we glimpse the reflection of Jesus' face, reminding us that divine love is not revealed in power, but in kneeling, in serving, in washing. As we remember the Last Supper, this image invites us to receive Christ's love and embody it in how we serve one another.

Tonight's Offering will be donated to *Rice and Beans*, a non-profit organization that is passionate about helping under-served communities. *Rice N Beans* provides, at two different locations, a hot meal, clothing, and personal care items to our unhoused neighbors in Gastonia.
