Dear FUMC Family,

As we continue on our Lenten pilgrimage, I want to share a poem I recently encountered that speaks beautifully to the journey of this season—and to the whole of the Christian life. It is called *Maps* by Holly Ordway:

Maps

Antique maps, with curlicues of ink
As borders, framing what we know, like pages
From a book of travelers' tales: look,
Here in the margin, tiny ships at sail.
No-nonsense maps from family trips: each state
Traced out in color-coded numbered highways,
A web of roads with labeled city-dots
Punctuating the route and its slow stories.
Now GPS puts me right at the center,
A Ptolemaic shift in my perspective.
Pinned where I am, right now, somewhere, I turn
And turn to orient myself. I have
Directions calculated, maps at hand:
Hopelessly lost till I look up at last.


One of the most revolutionary discoveries in human history came when Copernicus revealed that the earth is not the center of the universe. Our planet is but one among many, orbiting a distant sun—upending the Ptolemaic view that had shaped human understanding for centuries.


Ordway's poem traces a similar shift in the way we navigate our world. From ornate antique maps to the practical road atlases of family road trips (a staple of my childhood travels with my father!), we now rely on GPS, which, ironically, places us back at the center of everything. No matter where we go, we are the fixed point on the screen.

But in this technological advancement, have we actually become *pinned down*—trapped in a worldview that places us at the center? As Ordway hints with a clever turn of phrase, for all our progress, we are still prone to losing our way. I was reminded of this recently on an afternoon visit to Stowe Park. Many people around me were glued to their phones, seemingly oblivious to the beauty of the day. Too often, I am among them.

Poet and Anglican priest Malcolm Guite echoes the wisdom of Zen masters: "The map is not the reality." The same is true for us in our spiritual lives. Our Lenten practices—fasting, prayer, and acts of devotion—are meant to orient us, to help us navigate the journey of faith. But they are not the destination. At the heart of Lent, and of our entire Christian walk, is not a set of practices but a person—the Risen Christ—who calls us to be rooted in grace and to live out that grace in love and service. John Wesley often warned early Methodists not to mistake the means of grace for the end itself. Our ultimate goal is not simply to follow religious disciplines but to encounter the living God.

So, as we continue our Lenten journey—and the lifelong journey of faith—may we remember to look up. May we resist the temptation to place ourselves at the center and instead fix our eyes on the One who truly is. And in doing so, may we find ourselves not lost, but found—grounded in grace, guided by love, and moving ever closer to the heart of God.





April 6 - "I AM the True Vine" (John 15:1-8)

With spring in full bloom, we turn to a powerful image of our life in Christ: Jesus as the vine, and we as the branches. What does it truly mean to abide in Christ in a world dominated by technology and distraction? How are we called to bear fruit for the glory of God? And what in our lives might need to be pruned so that new, good, and life-giving things can take root and grow? Join us as we explore these questions and reflect on what it means to stay deeply connected to the source of all life.

April 13 - "I AM the Way, the Truth, and the Life" (John 14:1-7 - Palm Sunday)

On Palm Sunday, we follow Jesus on his way to the cross. As we step into Holy Week, we marvel at the journey he takes for us—standing in the gap for truth before Pilate, freely offering his life on the cross so that we might have new life in him. His way is not always easy; it is a narrow path. Yet, as the "pioneer and perfecter of our faith," Jesus shows us the way to true and abundant life. Come and worship as we begin this sacred journey together.

April 20 - "I AM the Resurrection and the Life" (John 11:17-26 - Easter Sunday)

Join us on Easter Sunday as we celebrate the hope of resurrection! In John 11, as Jesus stands at the grave of his friend Lazarus, he reminds us how often our hopes are too small. Lazarus is brought back to life, but he will one day face death again. Jesus, however, is resurrected—never to die again. Easter is not just about returning to life as it was; it is the beginning of something entirely new. In Christ, death is defeated, and all things are being made new. Come rejoice in the victory of resurrection and the promise of new life!

Palm/Passion Sunday April 13 | 8:30 and 11:00 a.m.

Join us for worship as we remember Jesus' Triumphant Entry into Jerusalem, marking the beginning of his final week leading to the cross.

Prayer stations will be set up in the Sanctuary and in the Narthex. This will give you an opportunity to reflect on Jesus' journey to the cross and ultimate sacrifice for us, and what God is calling you to let go of this season.

Maundy Thursday is named for the mandatum (Latin for "commandment") Jesus gave on this night to love one another as he shared his Last Supper with the disciples. The service includes beautiful music and a "stripping" of the altar, removing ornamentation and color from the chancel to mark the solemnity of the occasion.

Community Cross Walk Friday, April 18 | 12:00 noon | Lutheran Church of the Holy Comforter

Join our brothers and sisters in Christ from around Belmont for a moving, walk through downtown Belmont, remembering Christ's journey to the cross. The walk concludes at First Presbyterian Church.

Good Friday Tenebrae Service Friday, April 18 | 7:00 p.m.

Our Tenebrae Service, or "Service of Shadows" retells the story of Good Friday through Scripture, music and a gradual dimming of the sanctuary to total darkness. We remember on this night what makes Good Friday good, for on this day God's deepest love for us was revealed in the death of Jesus Christ.

We'll gather as a community with our brothers and sisters from around Belmont to celebrate the resurrection.



The United Methodist Church in Madagascar is witnessing remarkable growth through its Sunday School in Ambodifasika and the emerging faith community in Sambava. The Sunday School provides a vital space for underprivileged children to grow spiritually while also addressing their educational needs. Led by dedicated teachers, this ministry not only nurtures faith but also supports families struggling to afford schooling. Special events, such as Christmas celebrations, bring joy and hope, yet the need remains great for resources to continue this transformative work.

Meanwhile, in Sambava, a single testimony has sparked a movement, leading to a new worshiping community that has grown from five to 68 members. Despite legal and logistical challenges, these believers remain steadfast in their faith, gathering in homes and longing for a permanent place of worship. Efforts are underway to establish the first United Methodist Church in Sambava, but support is crucial. Through prayer, encouragement, and generosity, we can help build a foundation for lasting ministry and expand God's kingdom in Madagascar.

Update on the Parsonage and Pastor's Housing Allowance

As many of you know, our church parsonage sustained severe fire damage on September 28 of last year. The Board of Trustees continues to work closely with our insurance company to assess the full scope and cost of repairs. A restoration specialist has been contracted, and cleanup, along with necessary demolition work, is underway in preparation for reconstruction.

After much prayer and consideration, Pastor George and Catherine have made the difficult decision not to return to the parsonage, given the trauma of the fire and the heartbreaking loss of their pet. In the United Methodist tradition, the church is responsible for providing housing as part of our clergy's compensation. Pastor George's rental insurance has covered his temporary housing through April, and this month, he and his family will be moving into a new home they are purchasing in Belmont.

In consultation with our District Superintendent, the Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) recommended that the church provide Pastor George a housing allowance to assist with these costs. This recommendation was unanimously approved by the SPRC, Finance Committee, Administrative Council and will be presented to a called Charge Conference on March 30 (after this newsletter went to print). The current plan is for the Board of Trustees to rent the parsonage once repairs are complete, using the rental proceeds to help cover the cost of the housing allowance. In the interim, we have applied for grants from the Catawba Valley District to assist with these expenses.

Pastor George and Catherine share, "We are grateful for the support and care of our church family during this transition. Please continue to keep us and our church leadership in your prayers as we move forward together."

Interested in composting your food waste? A pilot composting program for Belmont residents has been extended through June 30, 2025! The City of Belmont Council voted to extend the program with the hope of increasing the number of participants. There are five food waste drop-off sites with designated collection bins located throughout Belmont. A local company, Crown Town Compost, picks up the food waste and will process it into nutrient rich compost. Here is an opportunity to recycle food waste, reduce solid waste going into the landfill and to produce more compost for use in the City of Belmont!
