Dear FUMC Family,

If you haven't done so yet, I hope you will soon join me and others in our church family in reading First and Second Peter this year. Peter's letters are short – so we're reading slowly, prayerfully, and repeatedly... when you get to the end, start again and see how the words speak to you in a different way a second (or third, or fourth) time. God's Word is powerful in this way. Through the Holy Spirit the written word comes to life and God meets us with wisdom and life.

Peter wrote his letters to scattered Christian believers facing great trial and tribulation. At the core, the letters are a call to love deeply, unselfishly, and sacrificially, echoing the love we have received in Christ. Consider these words in 1 Peter 4:8: "Above all, maintain constant love for one another, for love covers a multitude of sins." This verse challenges us to move beyond surface-level kindness and to embrace a love that perseveres through difficulties. Such love has the power to heal wounds, restore relationships, and reflect God's grace to the world. As followers of Christ, we are called to embody this love not just within the walls of the church but also in our families, workplaces, and communities.

In a recent meeting of our Strategic Planning Team, I shared a story from the great preacher Fred Craddock. He said too often we imagine our acts of love to be grand, glorious gestures that will attract notoriety and attention. "We think giving our all to the Lord is like taking a \$1,000 bill and laying it on the table—'Here's my life, Lord. I'm giving it all," Craddock writes. "But," he goes on, "the reality for most of us is that he sends us to the bank and has us cash in the \$1,000 for guarters. We go through life putting out 25 cents here and 50 cents there. Listen to the neighbor kids troubles instead of saying, 'Get lost.' Go to a committee meeting. Give a cup of water to a shaky old man in a nursing home. Usually giving our life to Christ isn't glorious. It's done in all those little acts of love, 25 cents at a time."

I hope you will join me in celebrating and affirming all of the little acts of love that make First United Methodist Church of Belmont possible. We depend on so many in so many ways, offering what they can, to fulfill our mission faithfully. I am grateful to you for the part you play and give thanks for the privilege of serving as your pastor. Please know that I am always here if you ever need anything. May the Lord bless you and keep you, now and always.

STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE -


Our Strategic Planning Team continues to meet and work, crafting a vision for ministry at FUMC in 2025 and beyond. The vision aims to chart a framework for what it might look like to live out our mission together in the years ahead. In 2024 the team:

- Met with our Bishop, Ken Carter, other leaders and "First Churches" in Western North Carolina as part of the conference's second "First Church CoHort."
- Engaged the services of a ministry and vision consultant, the Reverend Rene Wilt, who met with us for prayer and discernment on several occasions. Funding for this work has been provided by the annual conference.
- · Conducted surveys and listening sessions within the congregation and in the broader Belmont community, listening to better understand our current context.
- Began the work of discerning the broad themes of our listening work.

In January, we continued our discernment and made plans to hold targeted focus groups within the church and community. We look forward to sharing more with you as our work progresses. We continue to covet your prayers for our work and discernment.

Are you looking to grow your faith and meet new people? Try a Sunday school class, they begin at 10 a.m. on Sunday mornings.

- **Disciple** (taught by Brandon Martin) Located in the Old Fellowship classroom they use Bible Project videos and class questions to start conversations about what we believe as Methodists and how we respond to people who think differently. No topic is off the table and each Sunday may look and feel quite different, that's part of the fun.
- **Salt and Light Fellowship** (taught by Stephanie Beaty) Located in the Narthex meeting room, behind the information desk. This is a brand new class and is different from a traditional study. They begin with a Scripture devotional and reflection, then move into talking about their week and how God has moved in their lives.
- **Route 66** (taught by many members of the class) Located in room 304 this is a book/video based class. Their current study is called **"The Message of Jesus"** by Adam Hamilton.
- **Wanderers** (taught by Larry Kimel, John Tria, and Doreen Collins) Located in room 503 off of the Old Fellowship Hall. Their current study is called "Twelve Ordinary Men" by John MacArthur. It reviews the lives of the disciples and how we can learn from them how to walk in closer relationship with Jesus.







Year End Financial Update

General Giving

We ended 2024 with general receipts of \$714,592, up slightly over the previous year's total of \$711,431. General expenses for the year were \$739,248, also up over the previous year's total of \$680,484. Most of the increase in expense came from the areas of Church/Grounds and Salaries.

Narthex Construction Loan

Thanks to your generosity, along with input and decision-making from both the Finance and Endowment committees, we were able to reduce our construction loan by over \$200,000 in 2024!!! Our remaining debt is now \$526,236, down from our original loan amount of \$933,600. Thank you all for your contribution in helping to reduce this debt. It will free up funds for ministry and missions in the years to come.
