Charting the Future: New Strategic Plan Adopted

Since January 2024, a dedicated group of church members and leaders has been meeting as our Strategic Planning Team to discern a faithful path forward for the mission and ministry of First United Methodist Church. This team has engaged in a year-long journey of prayerful listening, learning, and planning with a deep commitment to helping our church become even more responsive to God's calling in this next, new season of ministry.

Early in the process, our team joined the *First Church Cohort*, connecting with other "First Churches" across Western North Carolina. These gatherings, led by conference staff and Bishop Ken Carter, offered valuable insight from leaders and experts across our connection and helped us think creatively about the opportunities before us.

Last summer, we held a series of listening sessions and distributed surveys to both our congregation and the wider community. The goal was simple: to hear deeply and honestly what people are experiencing, needing, and hoping for in the life of the church. To help us faithfully interpret that feedback, we invited the Rev. Rene Wilt to serve as a coach and facilitator. Her guidance helped the team shape conversations and conduct focused small-group gatherings to explore in detail how First UMC might live more fully into our mission.

Drawing from these many voices and moments of discernment, the team prayerfully drafted a strategic plan, which was presented and approved by the Administrative Council in March. This plan represents not just the work of a committee, but the shared hopes and vision of a church listening to God and to one another.

Our 2025 Strategic Plan for Ministry centers on three areas of focus: *Sharing Our Story with Others* by becoming more visible and confident in our witness; *Welcoming All* through building a church where every person is truly received and valued; and *Growing Personally in Faith* by deepening discipleship and streamlining ministries for greater impact.

The full plan, including key actions and guiding Scriptures, is included in this newsletter for your prayerful reading and engagement. We are excited for the months ahead as we begin to live into this vision together!

FOCUS ONE: SHARING OUR STORY WITH OTHERS

Developing a more visible presence in the community, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ and the mission and ministry of First UMC Belmont.

"Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you." - 1 Peter 3:15

- 1. Update church communications with a focus on the website and digital communications.
- 2. Provide training opportunities for congregation in the area of faith sharing and witness.
- 3. Develop and distribute promotional items for outreach.
- 4. Improve external church signage and other visuals to make our mission as a church more apparent and obvious.

FOCUS TWO: WELCOMING ALL

Building a community in which all people, without exception, are accepted and welcomed.

"Be hospitable to one another... Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received." – 1 Peter 4:9-10

- 1. Develop a comprehensive, intentional system for welcoming all people into the life of the church.
- 2. Explore and experiment with alternative ways of "being church."
- 3. Partner with existing groups in the community who represent those who are often excluded.

FOCUS THREE: GROWING PERSONALLY IN FAITH

Growing an atmosphere of accountability in which each of us is committed to deeper faithfulness in our relationship with Jesus Christ.

"Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." 2 Peter 3:18

- 1. Streamline and focus ministry activities through prioritizing and pruning.
- 2. Develop a comprehensive system to discover, develop, and deploy laity for mission and ministry.



Mention the Book of Revelation and you will usually get a quizzical look. The final book of the Bible, Revelation contains mysterious language and fantastic imagery that often confuses. *Revelation: Living with the End in Mind* invites us to hear Revelation not as a cryptic prediction of the future, but as a bold, hope-filled call to live faithfully in the present. Across five powerful visions, John reveals a God who reigns now, a Lamb who is worthy of worship, a church gathered in every language and land, a world being made new, and a future filled with healing, light, and life. Far from encouraging escape or fear, Revelation gives us courage for today—reminding us that God is with us, Christ reigns, and we are called to embody hope, justice, and love no matter what the world may bring. This Easter season, we live with the end in mind—not with fear, but with faithfulness, as we follow the Lamb and join in God's work of making all things new.

May 4 - Third Sunday of Easter (Graduation Sunday) Scripture: Revelation 1:4-8

Revelation doesn't open with dread—it begins with a deep breath of hope! This week, we'll hear how Jesus, the faithful witness, has freed us and called us into something beautiful: a kingdom of priests, serving God together. As we celebrate our graduates, we'll consider what it means to live faithfully and courageously into our own God-given callings.

May 11 - Fourth Sunday of Easter (Mother's Day) Scripture: Revelation 5:11–14

What if worship isn't just something we do, but the very heartbeat of heaven itself? This Sunday, we're drawn into a cosmic chorus around the throne of God. On a day when we honor those who've nurtured us and helped us to grow, we reflect on what it means to center our lives in praise, humility, and purpose.

May 18 – Fifth Sunday of Easter Scripture: Revelation 7:9–17

A multitude no one can count, from every nation, culture, and language, standing together in worship...this is the church as God envisions it! In this week's scripture, John's vision invites us to imagine and embody a community marked by healing, inclusion, and victory—not just someday, but today.

May 25 – Sixth Sunday of Easter Scripture: Revelation 21:1–6

"See, I am making all things new." These are not words of escape, but of presence and promise. This Sunday, we'll explore the power of God's faithful renewal—how God meets us in sorrow, dwells with us in love, and reshapes our hope. In a world that longs for peace, here is a vision of trust that holds us fast.


June 1 – Seventh Sunday of Easter / Ascension Sunday Scripture: Revelation 21:10, 22–22:5, 12–14, 16–17, 20–21 Revelation ends not with destruction, but with a garden—the tree of life blooming again, light without end, healing for the nations. This week, we step into a vision of ultimate hope: God's story brought to fullness, and our story caught up in it. "Come, Lord Jesus," we pray. And in the waiting, we live as people of the light.




OPPORTUNITIES TO GIVE AND SERVE
